- Direct Install provides existing small-to-medium sized facilities with a free energy assessment and pays up to 70 percent of eligible energy-efficiency upgrades.
- SmartStart Buildings offers significant financial incentives to eligible New Jersey businesses, helping offset incremental costs of installing energy-efficient equipment, including new incentives for commercial kitchen equipment.
- Pay for Performance is a customized approach to energyefficiency for larger commercial customers, providing incentives, linked directly to energy savings, for wholebuilding energy improvements.

Not sure where to start?

Assess your facility's performance with NJCEP's free energy benchmarking to track and score your actual energy usage and costs. Plus, get a detailed report along with information on implementing energy-efficiency technologies and available incentives to lower project costs. Municipalities and nonprofit agencies can check out NJCEP's Local Government Energy Audit Program, which subsidizes the cost of an energy audit.

Spring Cleaning? Don't Forget About Meter Safety.

We suspect early spring clean-up tasks are on your "to do" list. As you take time to spruce up your garden, remember that spring brings new growth and plantings. So be sure to keep the area surrounding your natural gas meter free of overgrown plants and other obstructions.

For meter reading and other safety purposes, we are required to have unhindered access to the meter at all times. Be cautious when mowing your lawn or operating other equipment around your meter. Do not lean ladders or metal objects against the meter. And never tie anything – including a dog leash, guy wire or ground wire – to a meter or its piping as this may cause a hazardous condition.

Following this advice will give our meter readers and other technicians easy access to your natural gas meter, especially in case of an emergency. If you feel your natural gas meter is in an unsafe location, such as too close to a driveway or under a deck, call us at 800-221-0051 for an assessment.

NJNG Wants You to Stay Safe: Know What to Do If You Smell Natural Gas

Since natural gas has no scent, a strong odorant that smells like rotten eggs is added to help you detect possible leaks.



If you smell natural gas:

- Remove any cigarettes or other smoking materials from the area, and then extinguish them.
- Do NOT use matches, lighters or other open flames or activate light switches, electrical appliances, flashlights, doorbells or even garage door openers, as they could create a spark.
- Do NOT use telephones (cellular included) on the premises where the leak is suspected. Phones can create a spark.
- Immediately evacuate everyone from the building then call NJNG from a safe location at 800-GAS-LEAK (800-427-5325). Let us know where you are.
- Do NOT re-enter the building until NJNG has declared it safe to do so.

For your safety, we promptly investigate suspected natural gas leaks as a FREE service 24 hours a day, seven days a week.
